STUDY TO WORK IN NEW ZEALAND

Students graduating with a bachelor's degree, postgraduate diploma, master's or doctoral degree and who have studied that programme full time in New Zealand for a minimum of 30 weeks will be eligible to apply for post-study work rights. The duration of post-study work visas now match the duration of a student's study in New Zealand, except for master's and PhD students who will continue to be eligible for a three-year post study work visa.

OUR REGIONS

The Waikato and Bay of Plenty regions of New Zealand offer a wealth of outdoor activities and attractions, as well as access to a world-class university education and vibrant city life.

Hamilton is New Zealand's fastest-growing city, followed closely by Tauranga. Located in the heart of New Zealand's "Golden Triangle", which includes Auckland, this area generates over half of the country's gross domestic product and fills more than 50% of all jobs in New Zealand.

The Waikato and Bay of Plenty regions are home to diverse and prosperous industries, including agriculture, forestry, horticulture, transport, freight, energy, technology, and tourism.

Both of our campuses are centrally located in New Zealand's North Island. You will enjoy a vibrant and multicultural city lifestyle surrounded by green spaces, beaches, and parks. Many major holiday destinations, such as Coromandel and Rotorua, are within a couple of hours' drive. Auckland, New Zealand's largest city and international gateaway, is just a 90-minute drive from our Hamilton campus and about 2.5 hours from Tauranga and the renowned Mount Maunganui beach.




Our main campus is located in Hamilton, New Zealand's fourth largest city. Vibrant and multicultural, Hamilton has strong links to industry and the export sector.

Located on the banks of the Waikato River, Hamilton boasts magnificent parks and gardens, colourful street art, and cool cafés and bars. The city is well positioned near the centre of the North Island, and it's close to beautiful beaches, native forests, and snowy mountains. Annual events include Balloons over Waikato and Fieldays, the largest agricultural event in the southern hemisphere, drawing crowds from all over New Zealand and beyond.

CAMPUS LIFE

The Hamilton campus covers 65 hectares of beautiful park-like grounds and lakes, providing a safe environment for students to live, study and socialise.

The Pā is the year-round home of campus life and contains Te Āhurutanga The Student Hub, food retailers and spaces for eating, relaxing, socialising and studying.

Other facilities on campus include The Village Green, student accommodation, cafes, a gym, pharmacy and student health services. Plus Hamilton's city centre is only a 10-minute drive away.

INTRODUCING: THE PA

The Pā is the landmark new building at the heart of the University of Waikato's Hamilton campus. The Bay of Plenty region offers an enviable coastal lifestyle, while still being close to Auckland and Hamilton.

At our Tauranga campus we have a student health nurse who can provide a range of health services. Counselling and general practice (GP) services are available near the campus.


THE WELLBEING HUB



SCHOLARSHIPS

VICE-CHANCELLOR'S INTERNATIONAL EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIP SUITE

Up to NZD\$15,000

These scholarships are awarded to new undergraduate and postgraduate international students studying onshore who can demonstrate academic excellence in their previous studies. The scholarships are merit based and contribute up to NZD\$15,000 towards tuition fees. Four different scholarships are available - one each for China, India, and South-East Asia, and one for the rest of the world.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO INTERNATIONAL ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP FOR SCHOOL LEAVERS

Up to NZD\$15,000

This scholarship is for onshore international students who have met direct entry from a New Zealand high school in the year prior to enrolling in an undergraduate degree programme. Students who achieve University Entrance in NCEA will automatically receive NZD\$10,000 towards tuition fees in their first year of study. In addition, students who achieve NCEA with merit endorsement will receive an additional NZD\$3,000 in their second year and students who achieve NCEA with excellence endorsement will receive an additional NZD\$2,000 in their third year. No application is required; the scholarship is automatically applied.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO COLLEGE INTERNATIONAL PATHWAY SCHOLARSHIP

NZD\$2,500 towards tuition fees

The award supports academically talented fee-paying international students embarking on a degree programme at the University of Waikato who undertake and complete an eligible programme of study offered by the University of Waikato College. No application is required.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO DOCTORAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Fully-funded scholarship over 3 years

The University of Waikato Doctoral Scholarship is open to applicants for full-time doctoral programmes at the University.

Successful applicants will receive up to NZD\$30,000 a year for up to three years full-time study (payable in monthly instalments), plus domestic tuition and Student Services Fees during the term of the scholarship.

To be considered for a scholarship, students must receive an Offer of Place in a doctoral programme prior to one of the four selection meetings each year.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO RESEARCH MASTERS SCHOLARSHIP

Up to NZD\$15,000

As part of our commitment to graduate research, the University supports students undertaking a master's thesis at the University. To be eligible, students should be intending to enrol full-time in papers 593 (90-point thesis) or 594 (120-point thesis) as part of their first master's degree at the University and have completed at least 120 points of study at a New Zealand university.

The New Zealand Government provides scholarships for international students from a number of countries around the globe by providing full tuition fees, flight tickets, medical and travel insurance, and more. Managed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFAT), these scholarships support sustainable development in partner countries and offer a life-changing experience for Manaaki scholars!



ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Manaaki New Zealand Scholarships are available to people from the Pacific and some countries in Asia, Latin America, the Caribbean, and Africa. Each country has slightly different eligibility criteria and a varied range of available academic subjects. Bachelor of Science – Computer Science

SELF-CATERED ACCOMMODATION

This style of accommodation is suitable for all students. In Hamilton, self-catered accommodation is shared with other students, each student with their own bedroom and some options available with own bathroom. Cooking and cleaning is shared between the groups and all basic necessities are provided. For our graduate and more mature students, we also offer independent apartments. Each apartment has its own kitchen, bathroom, living/study



This option provides you with your own single bedroom, shared bathroom and dining facilities with other students. Three healthy meals a day, seven days a week are provided. A bed and mattress protector are provided in all bedrooms.

The University of Waikato accommodation in Tauranga is just a three-minute walk from campus. I don't need to worry about taking the bus or having a car, I simply walk every day. Each room has its own ensuite which is a huge plus! The rooms are comfortable and you have enough space.

OTHER ACCOMMODATION OPTIONS

Homestay

Homestay accommodation is ideal for students who prefer a family-oriented lifestyle. Homestay (living with a local family in a private home) may be compulsory for international students under the age of 18 years. You will be provided with your own room and most meals are provided by the homestay family. Homestays are located close to a bus route to the campus. The cost of homestay accommodation is NZ\$357 a week, including food, power, laundry, but does not include phone, internet and transport costs. A non-refundable application fee of NZ\$470 and the first four weeks of homestay (NZ\$1,898) must be paid before a homestay placement can be made. See more details at waikato.ac.nz/homestay

Flatting

Many of our students choose to share accommodation with others in a private house located off campus - this is known as 'flatting'. The approximate cost of flatting for each person (based on recent figures with two to four flatmates) is between NZ\$180 - \$320 per week for a room, excluding food and utilities. Prior to arrival in New Zealand you can search online for flats or available rooms. We recommend you arrive at least two weeks before trimester starts in order to find suitable accommodation and get settled. Renting

You can rent a house in a nearby residential suburb for you and your family for approximately NZ\$500 - \$650 per week for a three bedroom home, excluding utilities and food.

To apply as a study abroad student, you must:


- Have a minimum B grade average (equivalencies may vary by country).
- · Meet English Language proficiency requirements.
- Have completed at least one year of full-time study and be currently enrolled at a recognised overseas tertiary institution.

You may apply directly or use the services of a study abroad agency. Study abroad students pay a set fee that includes tuition, additional charges and official transcript. The study abroad fee excludes costs such as insurance, accommodation, textbooks and field trips.

ENGLISH + STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMME

If you do not meet English proficiency requirements, you can enrol in an English language programme and increase your overall IELTS level by 0.5. The English language programme takes 8-10 weeks and is completed just prior to beginning your main trimester.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO COLLEGE

The University offers pathway programmes for students who have not gained direct entry to our undergraduate and postgraduate qualifications.

The University of Waikato College prides itself on providing a range of learning opportunities that are research-informed, locally and internationally connected, dynamic and distinctive. Whether you want to prepare for university study at undergraduate or postgraduate level, or improve your English, the College has the right programmes. The College also supports international study groups in a range of disciplines.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PREPARATION PROGRAMMES FOR ENTRY TO UNIVERSITY

The Academic English (Certificate of Attainment in English Language or Certificate of Attainment in Academic English) programme focuses on maximising your progress in each of the four core English skills – speaking, writing, reading, and listening. You will also learn study skills to help you learn faster with greater confidence and prepare you for study at the University.

FOUNDATION STUDIES

The University offers foundation programmes on the Hamilton campus for high school students who have not met the academic requirements for entry into degree study. This programme is offered either as a standard (30 week/two trimesters) programme or an accelerated (15 week/one trimester) programme.



Foundation Studies classes are shared with domestic students (except for English classes) which encourages international students to improve their English and make local friends. Classes are held on the same campus as all degree programmes, which helps students to become familiar with the campus and the way the University works.

INTERNATIONAL DIPLOMA – BUSINESS OR COMPUTER SCIENCE

The International Diplomas combine the first year of the relevant bachelor's degree with a programme of English Language, academic support, and development activities to provide you with direct entry to the second year of the bachelor's programme.

International Diplomas are the perfect option for students who narrowly missed out on meeting the criteria for direct entry to the Bachelor of Business, Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Computer Science programmes. International Diplomas are available in Business and Computer Science and are recognised by all New Zealand universities.

Business

Providing direct entry into the second year of the Bachelor of Business, this diploma is delivered in partnership with the Waikato Management School – a Triple Crown accredited, internationally recognised business school ranked in the top one percent worldwide. Students gain real-world experience while studying towards the Bachelor of Business through the work-integrated learning project.

Progression

Successful completion of 120 points in the International Diploma (Business) enables students to progress to any majors offered in the Bachelor of Business at the University of Waikato.

English language entry requirements:

An overall IELTS (Academic) score of 5.5 (with no less than 5.0 in any band) or equivalent.

Computer Science

Providing direct entry into the second year of the Bachelor of Computer Science and selected majors in the Bachelor of Science, this diploma is delivered in partnership with the School of Computing and Mathematical Sciences. Students will gain practical experience in labs equipped with some of the most up-to-date, high tech, computing facilities in New Zealand. Both degrees also include opportunities to work on projects with New Zealand companies through the work-integrated learning project.

Progression

Successful completion of 120 points in the International Diploma (Computer Science) enables students to progress directly into the second year of a Bachelor of Computer Science, or a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science, or a Bachelor of Science in Data Analytics at the University of Waikato.

English language entry requirements:

An overall IELTS (Academic) score of 5.5 (with no less than 5.0 in any band) or equivalent.

DIPLOMA IN POSTGRADUATE PREPARATION - PRE MASTERS (DipPP)

The Diploma in Postgraduate Preparation – Pre Masters (DipPP) is an eight-month (two trimester) Level 7 Diploma that aims to prepare international students for studies in selected postgraduate qualifications.

The DipPP provides international students, who either do not have the equivalent of a New Zealand bachelors degree or do not meet the requirements for direct entry, with an alternative pathway into a master's programme at the University of Waikato.

Delivered by the University of Waikato College, the programme teaches English language, academic literacies and the personal and professional skills that students need to succeed with postgraduate studies at a New Zealand university.

Upon successful completion of the Diploma in Postgraduate Preparation - Pre-Masters, students can progress to one of the following postgraduate degrees:

- Master of Applied Finance
- Master of Business and Management
- Master of Digital Business
- Master of Information Technology
- Master of Legal Studies
- Master of Nursing Practice*
- Master of Professional Accounting
- Master of Technology Innovation in Business
- Master of Environment and Society
- Master of Management (Supply Chain Management, Agribusiness, Business Analytics, or Project Management)

This programme may also be extended to other University of Waikato conversion masters qualifications.

PHD AND HIGHER RESEARCH DEGREES

The University offers supervised research degrees through the Master of Philosophy (MPhil), Doctor of Philosophy (PhD), the Doctor of Juridical Science (SJD), the Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA), and the professional doctorates, the Doctor of Education (EdD) and the Doctor of Health Science (DHSc).

Studying for any one of these degrees provides an exciting opportunity to work under the supervision of a team of research experts. University of Waikato academic staff are internationally connected, well-resourced, and benchmarked against the best in the world. As creators of knowledge, we encourage students to be leaders and innovators and, as a result, we produce research masters and doctorate graduates who contribute and compete at a global level in their chosen fields.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY (PhD)

3-4 years full-time

The degree of Doctor of Philosophy is awarded for a substantive body of independent research carried out under the supervision of at least two academic staff members. A PhD can also be presented as a PhD with Publication or a PhD with a Creative Practice Component.

My research project involves testing the validity and reliability of the Calf Raise App, an app that tracks and quantifies calf muscle performance across a different range of individuals, from youth to elderly and sedentary to high-level athletes. To compare the outcomes of the apps to gold-standard research equipment, I have been fortunate to use the facilities at the University's Adams Centre of High Performance in Tauranga.

I also enjoy being based at the new Tauranga city campus. The dedicated space for postgraduate students, including a kitchen and coffee machine, is convenient when I spend long hours writing my thesis.
